### Shared Priorities

## City Hall in the Park Showcases Laurel's Future Plans and Community Programs

The City of Laurel has launched new programs to strengthen the community and create opportunities for residents.

The Returning Citizens Employment Grant Program, managed by the City's Department of Economic and Community Development, offers up to \$10,000 to businesses that hire individuals meeting or completing probation/parole requirements. Through the Apprenticeship Maryland Program, Laurel is the only city in Prince George's County partnering with the state to give students ages 16 and older at least 450 hours of work training and a year of related instruction, preparing them for careers in manufacturing, STEM, and other high-demand fields.

The Homebuyers Assistance Program will help 10 first-time buyers or those who haven't owned a home in five years with \$5,000 each toward purchasing a primary residence, funded through the City's Fiscal Year 2026 General Budget. Lastly, the Adopt a Senior Program connects residents with local seniors in need, fostering meaningful relationships and community support.



### Director of the Department of Emergency Management Completes Prestigious Program



Directors of communications and public information officers from Annapolis, Berwyn Heights, Bowie, College Park, District Heights, Gaithersburg, Greenbelt, Hyattsville, Laurel, New Carrollton, and Rockville gathered for a focused one-day retreat to compare strategies and highlight what's working across their cities.

## Honoring the Missing

### City of Laurel Observes National POW/MIA Recognition Day

Across the United States, communities are gathering to mark National POW/MIA Recognition Day, an annual observance held on the third Friday of September. The day is dedicated to honoring the service members who were prisoners of war (POWs) and those still listed as missing in action (MIA), as well as their families who continue to endure uncertainty.

A central feature of many observances is the Missing Man Table, a symbol set with profound meaning. Each element on the table reflects aspects of sacrifice: the small round table represents the frailty of one person alone, the white tablecloth signifies pure intentions, the single red rose represents the bloodshed and the families who wait, and the empty chair stands for the missing service members. The display is often placed in a position of honor and serves as a reminder of the cost of freedom.

The City of Laurel will have a Missing Man Table on display in the lobby of the Joseph R. Robison Municipal Center on September 19, 2025, to honor the memory of those who have not returned home. The table will serve as a visible reminder for residents and visitors to pause and reflect on the sacrifices made by prisoners of war and those still missing in action.

## Enhancing Community Preparedness

### September is National Preparedness Month

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) launched the National Preparedness Month campaign in 2004, after recognizing the critical need for increased emergency preparedness. The campaign gained momentum in 2006 when FEMA collaborated with the Ad Council to develop widespread messaging. This communication effort significantly enhanced the education and motivation for Americans to prepare for emergencies. Throughout National Preparedness Month, government agencies, nonprofits, schools, businesses, and communities share information and resources that can be used by the public to get prepared for whatever emergency might occur.

Discussing emergency preparedness with your family and friends may not be easy. In fact, many people think they are protecting their loved ones by avoiding the conversation. However, planning and preparing for emergencies before they occur enhances your safety. During National Preparedness Month, “take charge,” “start the conversation,” and “prepare to protect.”

#### It's as easy as 1, 2, 3!

- Assess Your Needs:** Most communities face many types of hazards. It is important to understand the risks you face and your family's level of vulnerability. By determining this, it is easier to determine what you, your family, and your pets will need during an emergency.



- Make a Plan:** Make a plan and prepare for both evacuating and sheltering. Prepare for your family's unique needs with customized plans and supplies. In addition, use social networks to help friends and family members prepare and participate in community-wide disaster preparedness activities. Moreover, you should gather emergency supplies and secure the important information and documents you will need to start your recovery. Emergency plan templates can be found at [www.ready.gov/plan](http://www.ready.gov/plan). Once you develop a plan, review it with your family and practice it.

#### MAKE AN EMERGENCY PLAN



- Engage Support Networks:** Before a disaster strikes, build a support network of individuals and organizations to contact for assistance. This may include your family and friends, community members, local government, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and disaster response agencies such as the Red Cross.

### RESIDENT Q&A

**Question:** My street has several large potholes that haven't been repaired in months. Who should I contact?

**Answer:** Great question! For road repairs in Laurel, contact our Public Works Department at 301-725-5300, extension 2150, or submit a request online at [cityoflaurel.org](http://cityoflaurel.org). You can also email [publicworks@laurel.md.us](mailto:publicworks@laurel.md.us) with the specific location and photos if possible. Response time depends on severity - emergency repairs happen within 24-48 hours, while routine pothole repairs typically occur within 2-4 weeks depending on weather and crew availability. The city prioritizes repairs based on safety concerns and traffic volume. Don't hesitate to follow up if you don't see action within the expected timeframe - we want our roads safe for everyone!

## RESIDENT Q&A

**Question:** What are those "Bump-outs" on Main Street all about?


**Answer:** Great question! - They're part of a multi-stage Main Street safety enhancement the City has been working on the last couple years, including: (a) Flashing light cross-walks; (b) Enhanced pedestrian and traffic signs; (c) Updated pavement markings; (d) and more. The bump-outs themselves increase 'line of sight' for vehicles entering Main Street from the side roads — If you've attempted to turn onto Main Street over the years from these side roads, you've likely experienced difficulty looking up-and-down the street for cross-traffic. This makes that \*much\* easier, both smoothing traffic flow out and making it safer. (Search "bump-outs" on my blog for full project presentation slides.)


### Change in Reassessments

➤ The County's assessable real property base grew by double digits for FY 2026; the 11<sup>th</sup> year in a row of this level of gain. Assessments are phased-in over a three-year period.

➤ The County's property tax limit is the driving factor in actual real property revenue growth. For FY 2026 the Homestead Tax Credit is capped at 3%.

## Voter Registration Day

## Voter Registration Day



As the City of Laurel prepares for its general municipal election on Tuesday, November 4, 2025, we'd like to remind residents that the voter registration deadline is **Tuesday, October 14, 2025**, for those registering by mail or online. Voters who miss this window can still register on the same day during early voting (Saturday, November 1) or on Election Day, as long as they bring valid proof of residency, such as a Maryland MVA-issued ID, a utility bill, or a bank statement dated within the last 90 days.

To confirm that you're all set to vote, you can use the Maryland State Board of Elections' online "Voter Lookup" tool: [voterservices.elections.maryland.gov](http://voterservices.elections.maryland.gov). This tool lets you check your registration, find polling locations, view sample ballots, get ward and district info, request a duplicate card, or track your mail-in or provisional ballot status.

To access the "Voter Lookup" tool, you'll need to enter:

- Your first and last name exactly as registered (e.g., "Jeff" vs. "Jeffrey" matters)
- Your date of birth (month, day, year)
- The 5-digit ZIP code of your current Maryland residence
- Optionally, your street number to refine the search

If you've recently registered, it may take time for the system to update and reflect your registration.
